This project began thanks to students at Ridgetown College

I taught an Animal Health course there for years one lecture included euthanasia of livestock

The students asked me where they could find training courses as other employees (or producers themselves) wanted to take one

There weren't any courses being taught in the industry

- There is limited training in the field usually done on-farm: producers training own employees
- Confusion exists regarding euthanasia options and at what size of animal
- Confusion exists over correct use of captive bolt gun
- can easily buy on line but instructions are unclear
- Therefore a knowledge gap exists in our industry

- Therefore I decided to apply for a CAP funding round to create two captive bolt euthanasia courses:
 - swine
 - bovine





- ► Had support and financial contributions from:
 - DFO
 - Beef Farmers of Ontario
 - Veal Farmers of Ontario
 - Ontario Pork
- The various commodity groups also recognize the knowledge and training gap in on-farm euthanasia

- Had a team of 3 other bovine veterinarians to build the bovine course
 - included OVC veterinarian
 - Bovine vet with masters in animal welfare
 - Vet with extensive experience in practice and in teaching a different veterinary colleges
- Took about 12 months to put the two courses together

- ▶ This is a hands-on course
- Euthanasia of livestock should not be initially taught by video
- Objectives of course:
 - Discuss mental health aspects of euthanasia not everyone can perform this duty OR can do it every day
 - Discuss Codes of Practice Euthanasia
 - Discuss concussion; penetrating captive bolt vs non-penetrating
 - Target site
 - Safety of operator
 - Determination of death

Most importantly this is an animal welfare issue

CPE requires producer SOP for euthanasia to be developed in

conjunction with their veterinarian

Important to have the conversation with producers

- Knowing how to detect compromised animals that need attention
 - Case studies presented
- Understanding the need to euthanize a compromised animal NOW (and not leave until later, when likely will forget)
- Understanding that as caregivers for livestock, we should not allow unnecessary suffering




Work with various captive bolt types

About 20 mm or ¾" above the "eyebrows"; flat against the head *DO NOT aim towards the tail

- Can deliver mini course on-site in barns (more of a refresher)
- Designed to teach mass euthanasia (if necessary) for preparation in crisis events
 - Barn fire
 - Snow load collapse
 - FADs

- Started delivering courses on-farm during COVID (taking appropriate precautions) and since
- Have delivered courses to industry personnel
- Feedback has indicated that this course is very useful
- Refresher courses now being delivered
